Holton, Waterperry & Waterstock News is delivered monthly and free-of-charge to all households in the three parishes, with additional copies left in the parish churches.



## Letter from the Vicarage

Hello,

What do you associate with October. It's the month the leaves start to turn and fall and the month that the clocks go back, which always provokes a bit of sadness in me as I contemplate the darkness of the coming winter. For the Germans (and increasingly many other nations round the world) the month starts with Oktoberfest. This actually begins in September and is held in Munich and is the largest 'folk festival' in the world regularly attracting six million visitors. It has spawned copy-cat Oktoberfests all round the world all attracting tens and in some cases hundreds of thousands of visitors.

The first Oktoberfest was held in 1810 and included horse races and fairground activities. The horse racing was a regular feature up until the 1960s – I suppose it was felt it took up too much beer drinking time, after all over 7.7 million litres don't just drink themselves. According to Wikipedia the origin of the festival was when Kronprinz Ludwig, later King Ludwig I, married Princess Therese of Saxe-Hildburghausen on 12 October 1810 and the citizens of Munich were invited to attend the festivities held on the fields in front of the city gates to celebrate the royal event. Any excuse for a few beers – anyway over 200 years later the festival is bigger than ever and has successfully exported itself across the globe.

You can go to an Oktoberfest in the US (a number in different places), Canada, Brazil (one of the largest attracting over 700,000 visitors), Argentina, Australia, Chile, China, Russia, Sri Lanka and a number of other countries. Clearly all are united in their love of beer drinking! It occurs to me that the UN might be a good deal more successful if it operated on the same principle. That is getting everyone together to drink beer.

If we go way back to Old Testament times there were three festivals that were held in October. The Feast of Trumpets (Rosh Hashanah) was a time of repentance and introspection. The Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur) was a day for seeking reconciliation with God and atonement for sins and the Feast of Tabernacles (Sukkot) was the second of the celebrations of the harvest and a remembrance oof the exodus from Egypt. It is a time, 7 or 8 days depending on where you are, for thankfulness and 'dwelling' with God. Booths of branches and leaves are made. These are a remembrance of the temporary dwellings used in the exodus from Egypt and also by farmers during harvest time as they lived temporarily in their fields and vineyards.

As Christians we can take all the meaning from these festivals and celebrate them in the life of Christ. Christ came as the means by which God reconciled himself to humanity – if the exodus from Egypt meant the physical salvation from slavery the coming of Jesus represents the spiritual salvation from the slavery of sin and death. So while in our northern hemisphere during October the days shorten and the leaves start to fall the message of the festivals of the month is of hope and salvation, thankfulness and joy.

So raise a glass with the millions around the world celebrating Oktoberfest and remember that the God of the harvest and of Exodus is alongside celebrating with us.

Our produce stall was once again well supported thanks to everyone's efforts.

# Cyclo-cross at Wheatley Park School, Sunday 6<sup>th</sup> October

Wheatley Park is excited to be hosting a cyclo-cross race for the first time this autumn. Cyclo-cross is a fun and very family-friendly cycling discipline, providing one of the most accessible ways into competitive cycling. After a mass start, competitors race against each other for up to an hour over multiple laps of an off-road course with plenty of twists, turns, and natural or man-made features to test their technical skills alongside their speed and endurance. As an autumn and winter sport, there's usually plenty of mud thrown into the mix, too! Many top professional road riders such as Britain's Tom Pidcock have their roots in cyclocross. On Sunday 6th October, Wheatley Park will host Round 4 of the Central Cyclocross League with the event being organised by Bicester Millenium Cycling Club.

It will be a great opportunity for anyone who enjoys cycling with a serviceable bike capable of riding on grass and mud to get a taste of competition in a safe, friendly and supportive environment. # Waterstock Golf Course - Update

Henry Manisty provides a short update on where things stand on the Developer's Appeal against SODC's refusal of planning permission to develop the western section of the golf course site:-

A milestone was passed on 17<sup>th</sup> September when Waterstock and the two other parties, SODC and Greystoke the developer, exchanged their Proofs (summaries) of the evidence that their witnesses will give at the Planning Inquiry. The Proofs are now available on the SODC Planning Register. There you will find submissions from Michael Tyce (Green belt, Waste & Economic Issues), Rob Arthur (Noise & Sustainable Transport), Nick Edmondson (Golf), Arabella Whelan (Equestrian) and me (Heritage, Landscape & Ecology). Supporting submissions were also made by Chris Shaw, (Highways and Sustainable Transport); Ben Piper, RTCT Chair (Flooding and Drainage); David Fraser RTCT CEO (Ecology); Nick Marriner (Birds); Roger Heath-Brown (Botany); Bob Flint, Technology Entrepreneur (Need), Nick Moon, CPRE's Public Rights of Way lead (PROWs) and David Youens, a Member of Waterstock Golf Club (Golf).

Our barrister gave our submissions a 5-star rating and we seem to be as strongly positioned as we possibly could be. Thanks are due to all those who devoted time to preparing their Proofs, and also to Michael Talbot, who produced superb graphics to illustrate points being made, as well as providing constant technical support. Particular thanks too to those from outside Waterstock who, in each case, prepared excellent Proofs.

This is a complicated planning case with **so many** issues contested. The SODC planning lead says she has never encountered anything as complicated. It has certainly felt that way to those Waterstockians taking part in the preparations.

The next stage is the Planning Inquiry itself, which begins on 15 October at Cholsey.

Try and by there for the first day at least, where the barristers for the 3 parties will make their opening statements, and perhaps attend on other days to support our witnesses.

### Waterstock News

The last month has been a busy month in the village socially. Significant wedding anniversaries and big birthdays have been well celebrated with the appropriate musical accompaniment.

It's all change at Red Fox Barn in Park Farm Yard. Goodbye to Jamie and Emily and hello to Jamie and Emily, which keeps things simple for those who struggle with names! Romeo the dog has moved in too. The New Jamie is Oxford United's goal keeper and he and Emily run a business together called Mighty Slice, producing high protein desserts. Emily said to get in touch if any one would like to sample their delicious and nutritious cheesecakes.

September 14th was the day of the annual Historic Churches Trust "Ride + Stride" to raise money for the upkeep of historic churches from which Waterstock has recently benefited. The idea of the fundraiser is that people get themselves sponsored to visit as many churches as they can that day where they 'sign in.' Of the money they raise half goes to their own church and half to the fund itself. Even though Waterstock had no riders or striders this year and only one visitor to the church during the whole day, we somehow raised a magnificent £220 as if by a miracle but actually through the generosity of Waterstock folk.

Continuing the theme of the generosity of the people of Waterstock, can I remind you about the annual British Legion Poppy appeal. I will be round the village with the poppies once the appeal is launched at the end of October. But do you ever wonder where all those poppies come from?

The answer is the Poppy Factory in Richmond upon Thames.

Major George Howson MC founded the Poppy Factory in 1922. His vision was to provide work for wounded, sick and injured veterans of the First World War. A thriving community of veterans was quickly established in Richmond Upon Thames and the legacy continues today. During his working life Nick had the responsibility of supplying the red and green paper used in the making of the poppies and had the privilege of touring the factory on several occasions as well as attending The Field of Rembrance Service at Westminster Abbey, first held in 1928 and attended by members of the Royal Family. Preparation for the next year's Remembrance Day begins as soon as the previous Remembrance Day is over with the selection and ordering of carefully coloured matched paper. The work of the Poppy Factory and the British Legion helping veterans physically and mentally affected by their service transition back into a meaningful place in society continues today, so please be as generous this year as you have in the past.

Waterstock has its own little charity, the Charitable Trust of Ambrose Bennett, established in the early 17th century. Its stated aim is the relief of poverty in elderly widows and widowers in the parish of Waterstock. It has a tiny annual income but it is properly registered with the charity commission and administered by three trustees, including myself. At least one trustee is looking to step down so if anyone would like to be involved please do contact me. We usually only have one meeting a year and to be honest it's not a very onerous task to be a trustee of such a small charity and it's rewarding to feel part of a Waterstock tradition which has been going for so long.
