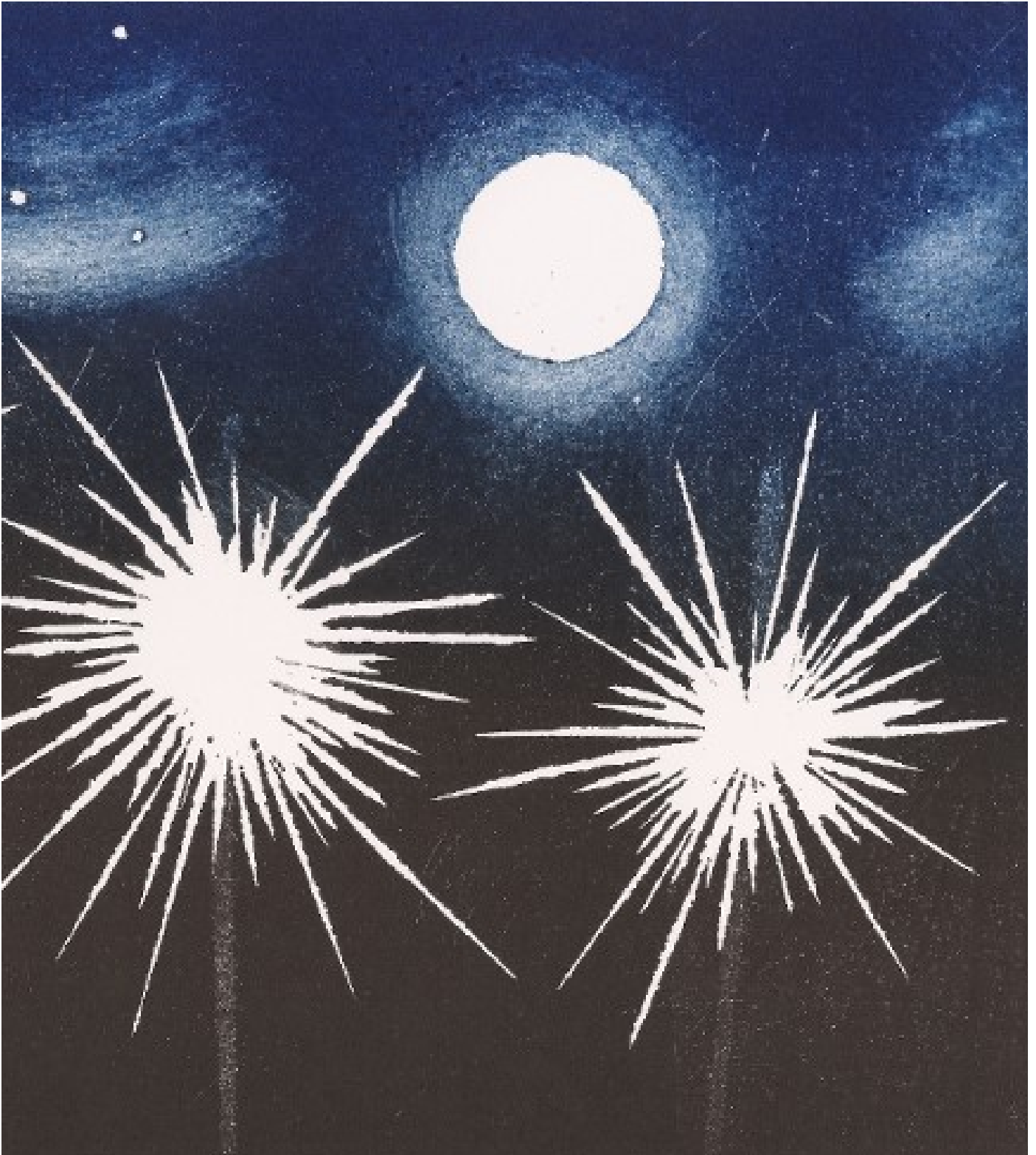

Letter from the Vicarage

Hello,

I am writing this from hospital. I tell you this not for sympathy, the reason I'm here is a simple knee replacement due to sporting abuse over many years – so self-inflicted! What you notice immediately on arrival in hospital is the loss of agency. The staff are great and it's all very efficient but it's clear from the first minute of your stay that you are now subject to procedures and processes and are now perceived simply as someone to be treated. For some people this is not a problem. In fact handing over control to the experts for a while for some can be relaxing.

I'm not one of those people! I struggle with being told what to do – even by people who are clearly hugely talented and experienced. I realise that this can be a character defect but I think it stems from the need I have to be fully informed and participating in the decisions being made about my life. And of course this is a universal experience, we all feel like that as 'consenting adults' – indeed society expects us to be in control and responsible for our choices and actions.

This experience of relative powerlessness, putting oneself in the hands of others, has set me thinking about the complex set of relationships I and many of us have through which we negotiate that necessary sense of personal agency. This set of relationships covers a huge range from the mundane – the parcelling out of chores in the home for instance, to the hugely significant – caring for children or indeed the necessity of having an operation. The fact is that while we all want to be in control and would like to think we are, we are constantly relinquishing control in many small or large ways.

And a lot of the time that giving up of control is done willingly and joyfully, after all loving someone is to offer up control, because we all know that it is through sharing our lives like this that we know what it is to be fully and wonderfully human. And now the God bit – the Bible tells us that we were created to be in relationship and so to share the control of our lives. And one of those relationships we are offered is with God and in it we are offered both a chance to share ourselves with him but also, crucially, to have him share his life with us.

Imagine that – the creator of the Universe offers himself to us to share in who we are and give us the 'keys' of his creative power and eternal presence. What he asks of us is a willingness give of ourselves to him. It's not us handing over control that he wants, it's the opportunity to expand our horizons and increase our potentials. So like my stay in hospital, putting myself in the hands of the surgeon in order that my physical horizons and potentials are increased, so God holds out his hand and says: 'Let me show you who you can be.' For God as he relates to us it's not really a power sharing deal or a handing over of control to him. In fact we gain more control of our lives as it's a free gift of himself, given to make us more fully human.

So as I'm being weighed and measured, prodded and poked here in hospital I know that God will always treat me as the unique and complex human being that I am and love me as his precious child. And of course you are loved as one as well.

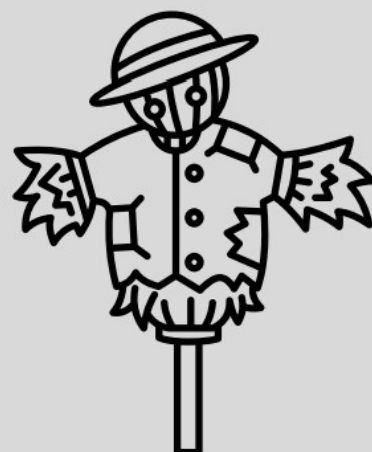

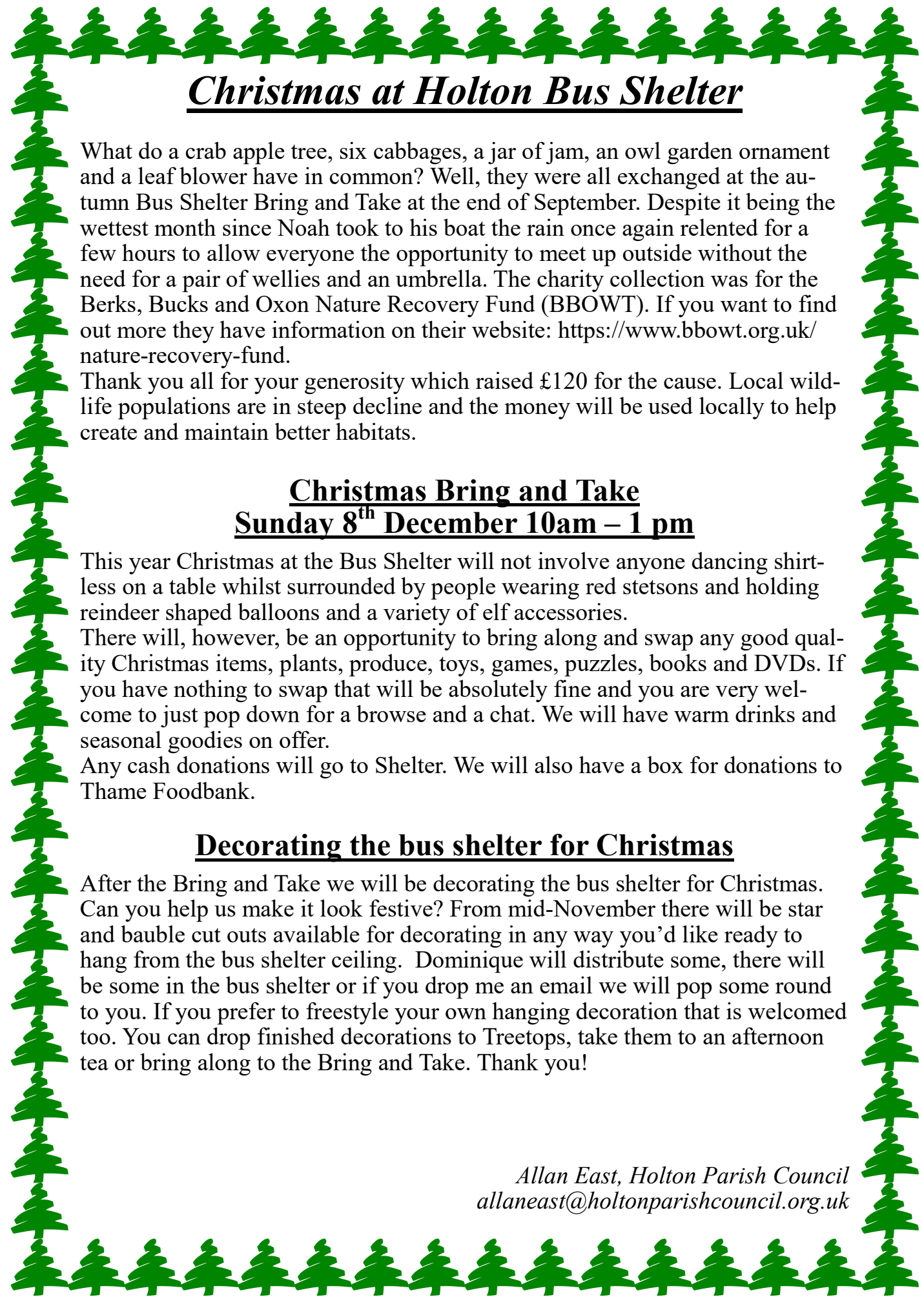

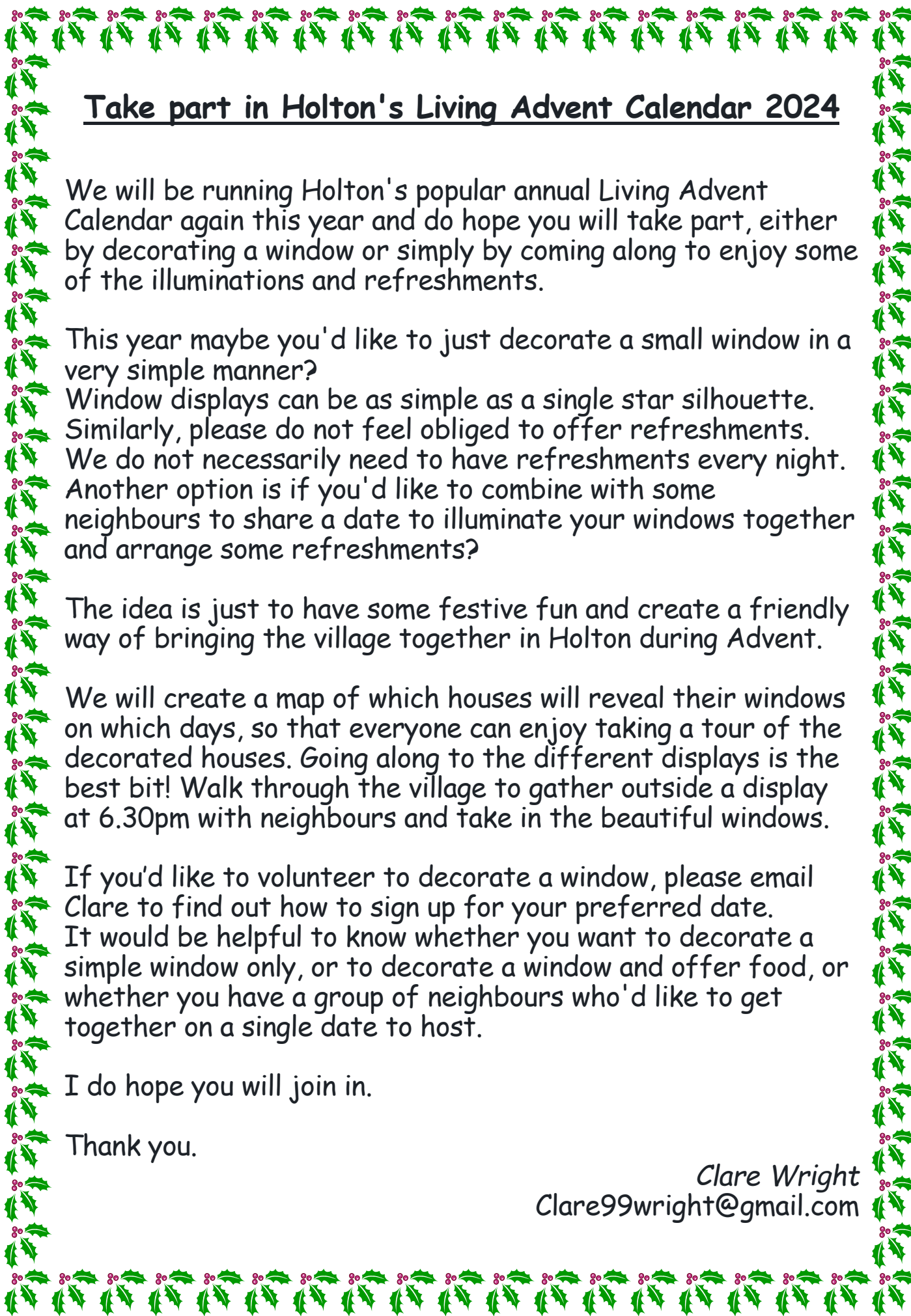
Holton Cock and Bull

Waterperry News

I'm sure I don't need to make any comment about the weather over the last month – we've all seen the photos, read the reports, splashed up the road and lanes and paddled around our own gardens. So all I'll say is that I really REALLY hope that's our rain allocation done & dusted now and that winter will be kinder to us all. I realise that might be a wish too far! As I write, this last week has felt positively summery – the sun is shining and it's actually warm! Summer flowers and roses are still in fresh bloom and it's been fun to get a cheery wave from a bunch of village children as we get home in the afternoons. Bombing around on their bikes enjoying the late summer sunshine and not bent over their phones – so refreshing!

Parish Council – our next meeting is scheduled for 21st November: please come along to be part of what deciding what goes on in the village. Here are some recent discussions we've had: Driving to and from work through Oakley and Brill, we've seen several times the roadside drains being cleared by a truck with a large hose 'sucking' up the water and muck, leaving a free-flowing drain and clearing persistent roadside puddles. Of course, these are in our neighbouring county and heaven forbid that they'd venture onto Oxfordshire roads but I've been onto Highways at OCC to ask why they can't provide the same service for our village surface water drains. As far as I've seen this year all we've had is a road sweeper lorry that seemed to brush more gravel and earth *into* the road and drains than it actually cleared. I'm sure it's not only the drains near us that are so blocked with mud that they aren't even visible now so of course water just sits on the road. So far all I've had is a reply to say this is now handled by "Area Operations, Cyclical Maintenance team" and my query has been forwarded on for them to consider and respond. I'm waiting.....

The Waterstock golf course development: the fight against this continues. As I drive around I see every week that business, science park and warehousing developments in the area have lots of long-term vacant units so it's hard to understand how this development can be justified, but the agent is very determined to make his money from pushing through for permission. This isn't just Waterstock's battle, we'll all be affected by the detriment to wildlife and the environment, so please do what you can to support the cause when the appeals go out. The parish council voted to make a donation to the fund towards the legal work that is needed, but individual support and donations are very much appreciated by Waterstock please see their mailings and posters for information.

Village biodiversity: at our last meeting the parish council discussed the possibility of uniting as a village to help wildlife and nature conservation. It is several years since we had hedgehogs in our garden – I was told by Tiggywinkles that our badgers in close proximity preclude us from rehoming any hedgehogs that have been injured or orphaned. Does anyone else still have them? We have also noticed a definite decline in the bat population over the last few summers. We discussed that perhaps a 'working group' could be set up to take action on this – it would be informal, as in not requiring any committee or things like Agendas and Minutes, but the group could put ideas to the parish council to request funding and support for any projects. Our initial ideas were for the PC to perhaps buy a number of bat boxes or owl boxes to be placed in volunteers' trees; or perhaps for children to carry out a survey of wildflowers and small wildlife in the graveyard which is already a largely undisturbed sanctuary habitat. We'll have a noticeboard that could be used to make a village nature board, so Come on, get together with your neighbours to come up with ideas – Caroline is happy to be the 'go-between' and we'd love to hear from you.

Finally – as you will have heard, Mary Harrison sadly died at the end of September. Mary and her family have been part of village life for around 60 years, coming here originally when her late husband, Oliver, worked on the estate, particularly growing vegetables in the South and West Fields as well as in their own garden – Mary was proud to show me photos of the impeccably straight rows of veg in the garden at Spinney Cottage. After Oliver died Mary took great pleasure in her garden, turned over now to lawn with specimen trees and several clumps of her favourite pampas grass. An oak tree in the middle of the garden was presented by the then steward and staff at Waterperry House, dedicated to Oliver. Mary loved watching the birds at her bird table and also the comings and goings to the garden centre past her front windows and at 96 years old, until a few weeks ago she would still be out there every day, filling bird baths, topping up bird feeders and pulling out weeds. Her great love through all her years here was for her various cats - I remember her showing me a book about cats that her husband gave her, with the inscription “for Mary, who loves cats more than she loves me” (a story also mentioned in a dedication at her memorial service)! Her last little puss, Dusty, died just a few months earlier this year. Mary missed her companion hugely and it seems fitting that neither of them have to face this coming winter alone. I shall miss Mary as cheerful neighbour, always happy to invite me in for a natter. There was a memorial service for Mary after a family funeral service on the 11th October, full of warm memories and family love. Shirley, Michael and Sara asked me to thank everyone that came along to remember their Mum and that helped decorate the church with beautiful flowers. It’s rather lovely that the family connection continues, as Michael has now come to work part-time on the estate.

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Waterstock News

As I write the weather has turned warmer and we have seen some sunny days. A vast improvement on the awful wet weather and flooding that we have experienced recently with some villagers driven from their homes due to flood damage, in some cases for up to 6 months. Sincere sympathies to those that have been affected.

Never have I seen the road flooded so badly outside our house with such a strong current it was running like a river. Some cars managed to get through with water coming over the top of their front bumpers. I hope that the engines survived! While a van nearly ended up in the ditch as the driver completely miscalculated where the edge of the road was. We got off quite lightly compared to some, 2 of our stables flooded, but fortunately not our house. Many thanks to all those that helped clear the ditches opposite Home Farm after the flooding. It has definitely made a difference. Further works are being discussed to alleviate the problem.

Rosalind reports that the "Harvest Festival service in the church this year was made particularly special as it was combined with the Christening of Robert Alexander Heron, otherwise known as Bobby, son of Shona and Tom, his older brother Joss also enjoyed the service and took an interested part. It was a great service; the church decorated with fruit and produce and lots of young families and friends gathered for this combined celebration. David manged a very successful juggling act of this unusual blending of festivities.

The Harvest produce was taken a few days later to Wheatley Church, now newly restored and reopened, where they hold a weekly open house "Larder" session for people to come in and help themselves to food and contribute something or not, as they wish. The donated food is beautifully presented by helpers and provides a good social afternoon for many."

The Planning Inquiry into the proposed development of the Western section of the golf club, finally got underway on Tuesday 15th October at the Great Hall Cholsey. Henry has provided a report of the first week's activities;

"The first topics selected for review were Landscape and Green Belt where Henry Manisty (Landscape) and Michael Tyce (Green Belt) represented Waterstock, and where the (always impressive) Michelle Bolger, who had previously been engaged by Waterstock, represented SODC as their landscape witness. Then it was the turn of Arabella Whelan, with a barnstorming performance, to set out the horse-riding concerns. Greystoke's expert was mercilessly taken apart by SODC's and our barrister.

Thursday morning was set aside for individuals to make representations to the Planning Inspector. The range and quality of the representations was impressive. Freddie de Mierlo, our MP, and Tim Bearder, our Councillor, made strong supporting contributions, as did Chris Hill (on behalf of Tiddington PC) and David Mancey (Wheatley Society). Wendy Walker and Margaret Allen flew the flag for Waterstock Golf Club members, in particular female members, stressing physical and mental benefits. Troth Wells from Oxford put the case for the equestrian community, as did Tamsin Woods from Ickford, speaking in her capacity as a coach for the Riding for the Disabled Association and also representing those from Ickford who enjoy the Ickford, Waterstock, Waterperry, circular work. Waterstock was well represented with excellent contributions from Susie Edmondson, Sarah Godowski, John Wilkinson, Rosalind Portman, Michael Haffey and Jane Harper.

Thursday afternoon was the Inspector's Site visit, which comprised a long walk that took in visits to the Golf Club, walking the Oxfordshire Way to Waterperry, the two footpaths on the Site and Waterstock Lane. Arabella showed the Inspector around the Riding School. Thankfully, it was a fine afternoon, and it all seemed to go well. One high spot

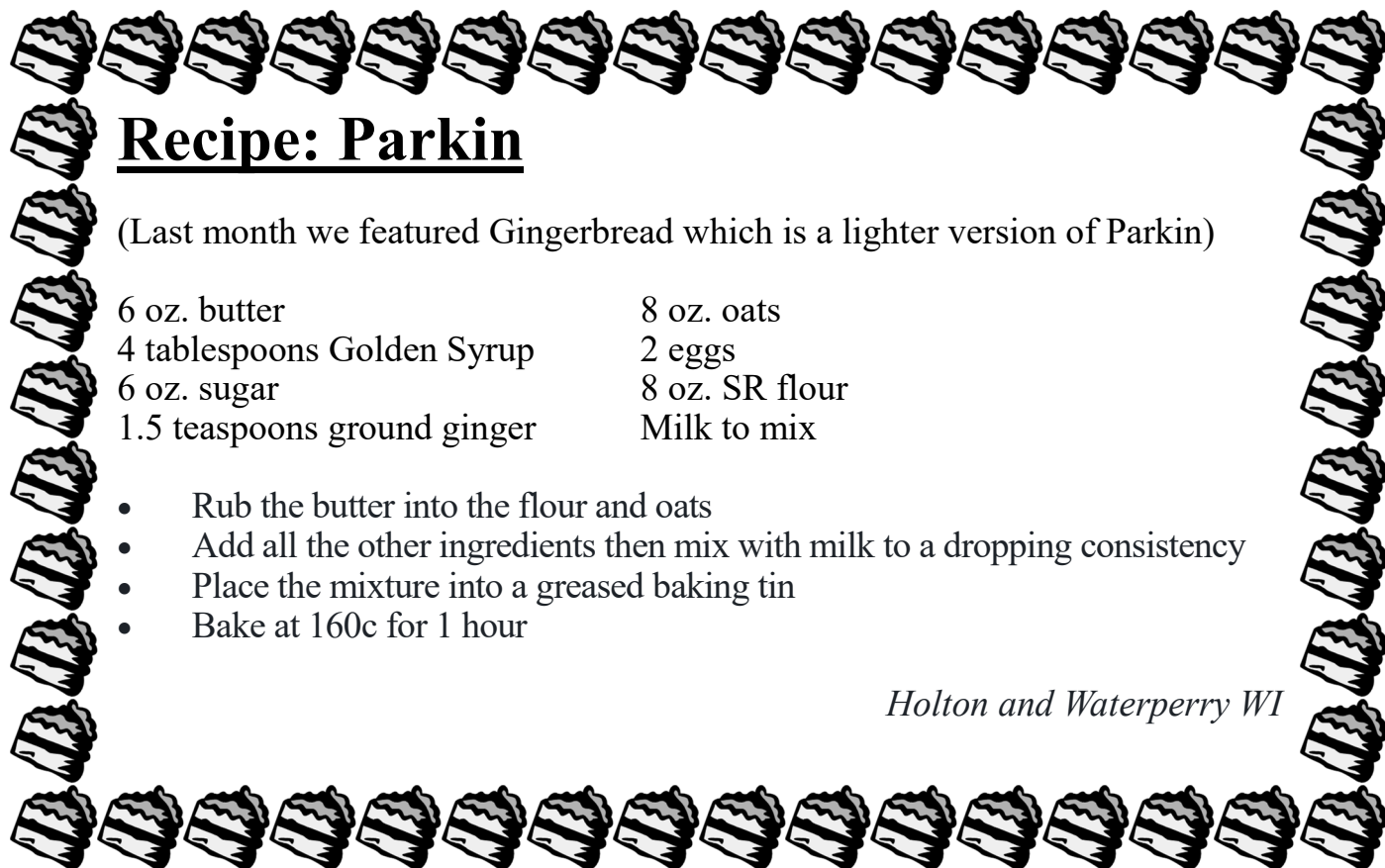
was guest appearances by roe deer on the golf course while we were walking. On Friday 18th it was the turn of the botanist Professor Roger Heath-Brown to give evidence on behalf of Waterstock. Roger was quietly effective in pointing to important mistakes and omissions in the Greystoke case. We expect Nick Marriner to further undermine Greystoke's ecology case, by similarly pointing to numerous mistakes and omissions, when he gives his evidence on birds on Tuesday 29th October.

It was great that so many Waterstockians made it to Cholsey - NOT a convenient location - to support witnesses. All in all, things got off to a good start."

Recipe: Parkin

(Last month we featured Gingerbread which is a lighter version of Parkin)

6 oz. butter	8 oz. oats
4 tablespoons Golden Syrup	2 eggs
6 oz. sugar	8 oz. SR flour
1.5 teaspoons ground ginger	Milk to mix

- Rub the butter into the flour and oats
- Add all the other ingredients then mix with milk to a dropping consistency
- Place the mixture into a greased baking tin
- Bake at 160c for 1 hour

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
