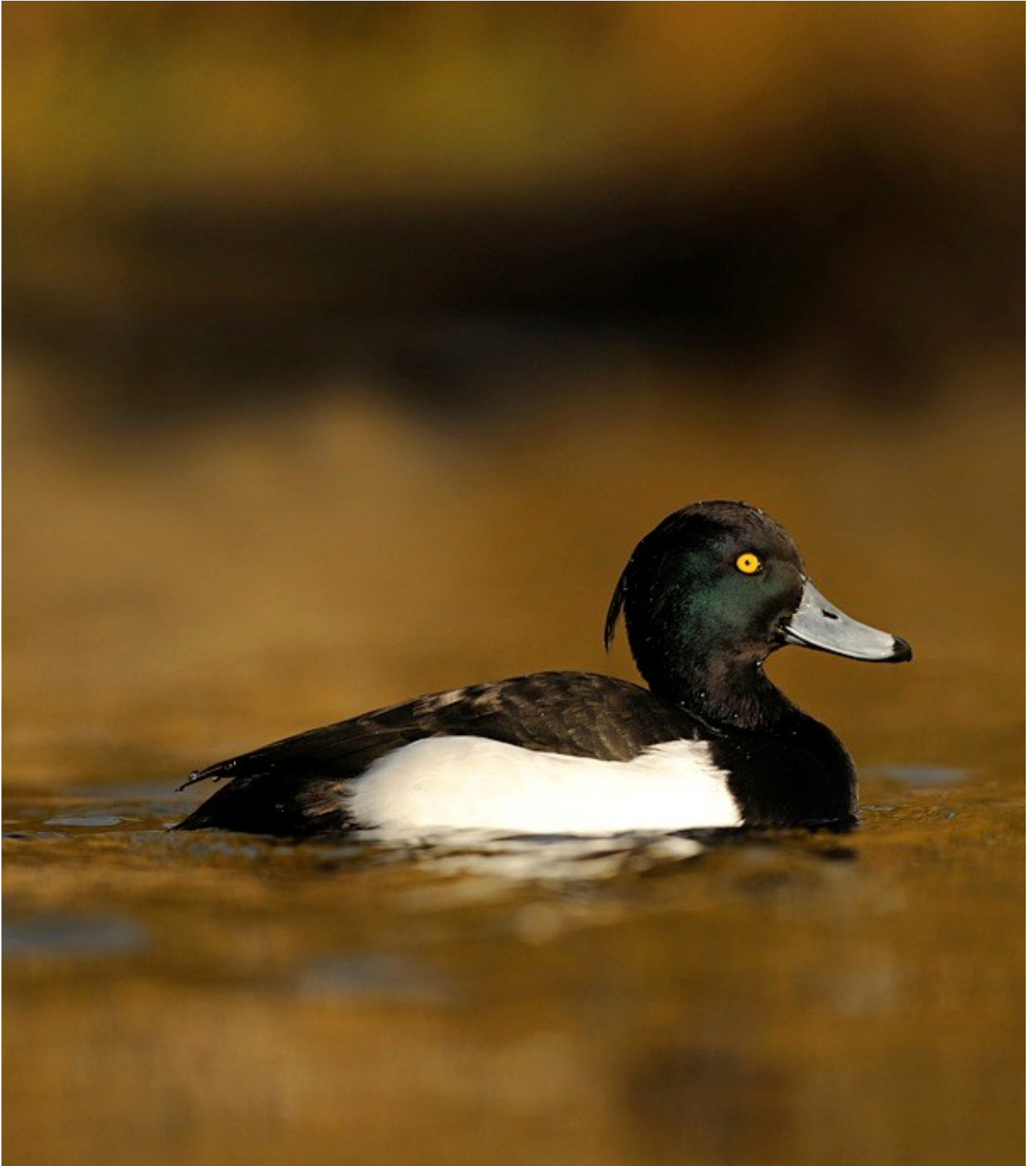

Letter from the Vicarage

Although February is the shortest month of the year it can sometimes seem to drag on forever as winter appears to refuse to let go and allow us into the beginning of Spring. Not for nothing was it called Solmonath (mud month) in Old English. The Finnish, who know a thing or two about winter, call it Helmikuu, meaning "month of the pearl" for when snow melts on tree branches, it forms droplets, and as these freeze again, they are like pearls of ice, which is a lovely poetic way of acknowledging that although it is technically the last month of Winter it can be b***y cold!

In fact the Roman month Februarius, from which we get the name February, was named after the Latin word *februum*, which came to mean 'purification' after the instruments called *februa* which were used in the purification rituals which occurred in February, which were a preparation for the beginning of the new year in March. And nature's cycle in the northern hemisphere means that February sees the final clinging on of winter before the 'new year' of Spring takes hold and regenerates life into the land.

The most famous, now global, celebration in February is, I suppose, the 14th – Valentine's Day. We often seem to celebrate with food on this day, fattening each other up as a sign of our love! Also connected to food but somewhat more mysterious and closer to home is the honouring of 'Meal Monday' in Scotland, this year on Feb. 9th. Are we to infer from this that Scots normally go without food on Mondays? Actually it was the day given to students in Scottish Universities to go home to replenish their stores of oatmeal on which they subsisted for the majority of the time. It seems all academic thought in Scotland was well founded on porridge.

The other well known celebration is on the 2nd; Groundhog Day. As noted before in this Newsletter although a North American festival, originally from the small Pennsylvanian town of Punxsutawney, it has become famous outside of the US due to the film of the same name starring Bill Murray. However there are now many celebrations of Groundhog Day through the US when groundhogs are bought out of hibernation and if they see their own shadows at least 6 more weeks of winter are guaranteed, if not – spring is on its way.

The film tells the story of an obnoxious, utterly ego driven, TV Weather Man who is trapped in Groundhog Day forever, seemingly doomed to live the same day over and over again. In the end the only way he can break out and move on is by discovering a genuine love of other people and inspiring others to love him. I saw it again recently and it struck me that he was given a chance that most of us don't get, that is to be able to relive moments we wish we could go back and do again, but better this time.

The fact is that I know I'm doomed to repeat my mistakes unless I learn from them and then I normally find new mistakes to make. Jesus pointed to the self-evident fact that no one ever has a perfect day, 'all have sinned' he said. We don't get a Groundhog Life when we can just go on until we are perfect, we'd never get there. However Jesus also said that God's 'grace', the free gift of his love, meant that forgiveness, a chance to move on was on offer to all. We don't have to be perfect, God loves us immensely just as we are. We are not doomed to have to endlessly repeat ourselves but through the love of God we can all grow and experience real transformation, day after day.

Local Government Re-Organisation

All the proposals for unitary authorities for Oxfordshire have now been submitted for a decision by the Minister responsible for Local Government Reorganisation.

Holton Parish Council has joined with the 48 Parishes, who would be incorporated into the Greater Oxford Unitary Authority proposal from Oxford City and signed a letter strongly objecting to this scheme as it does not meet the criteria for a number of reasons and also believe that the proposal will damage rural communities that currently do not see themselves as in any way part of Oxford City.

The five MPs responsible for the 48 Parishes are also all strongly opposed to the Proposal and have written to Secretary of State accordingly

The next Parish Council Meeting will be held on Monday 9th February 2026 starting at 7.00 pm in Holton Village Hall Committee Room.

Waterperry News

As ever, the year is already rushing past: February already and thoughts turn to half-term holidays, Valentine Day and Spring just around the corner. Snowdrops are out in abundance in the garden and the daffodils along the verge are already starting to flower – although that could all falter and slow down if we get any more proper cold weather. I know I should take a grown-up, sensible-hat-on view on this, but I'm so disappointed not to have had any snow! I live in hope of even just one nice walk in a proper covering of crunchy fresh white stuff, rather than splashing along in muddy puddles! I remember several years ago, when our village young teenagers were still of nursery/primary school age, one day when the word went out that there'd be a gathering on the lawns and in the Rec to build snowmen (school was cancelled!). A few snowball fights ensued and there was a rather handsome snow goose sitting on a teasshop picnic table for a few days.

It's a quiet time of year, so just a few notes of general information and parish council news. First of all, while on the subject of puddles, the roads continue to disintegrate under our wheels. As ever, the council blames the government for lack of funding, but I do have to question whether the local councils spend their funds wisely on the 'dragon patcher' repairs that fail within a few weeks of being made. Still, that's all we have at the moment so I'll just remind you that potholes can be reported on www.fixmystreet.com. It's important to report them when you spot (hopefully don't disappear into) a new pothole: by law the council has to have a system of checking and repairing roads and they have a responsibility to fix large potholes if they know about them. So, you'll potentially be doing other drivers a favour by alerting the council; if a motorist wants to claim from the council for damage caused, it is very helpful to be able to show that they had been made aware of the problem. If you are unfortunate enough to incur damage to your car from a pothole, you are entitled to claim compensation and there is information on how to do this online, including from the AA and from the MoneysavingExpert.

Closer to home, I attended an interesting talk in Wheatley just before Christmas given by the River Thame Conservation Trust as part of their 'Community Currents' project to improve and protect our local rivers and streams. I was surprised to find out how much work they do around the river environment and wildlife protection. Much of it is carried out by volunteers who give even a small amount of time to observing and recording – if you are a regular walker anyway, it could be easy to offer a bit of help. They have another meeting coming up later this month – I'll put details on our Facebook page.

In the village – I hope everyone has noticed the very smart new noticeboard on the bend opposite Manor Farm! It is in a slightly more prominent position, so please do check it for public notices and parish council meeting details. The old noticeboard is too special to just throw away (it was originally commissioned for the Millennium) so it has been moved into the churchyard, where the plan is to repurpose it as an insect hotel – look out for further details in the Spring when we'll organise a volunteer project to set it up.

Finally, verge posts! The parish council is currently getting quotations for the purchase of a small number of verge posts. These should be available later in the Spring and priority will be given to replacing those that have been damaged beyond repair and to trying to protect particularly vulnerable sections of verge throughout the village.

By the time you read this Village News, we will probably already have had the January parish council meeting. Further details will follow in the coming weeks of plans for a village Tidy-Up and litter-picking day and other village projects or events.

Keep your eyes on that noticeboard!

Recipe: Roasted butternut squash risotto

600 g butternut squash, peeled and cut into bite sized pieces
4 tablespoons olive oil
1 teaspoon clear honey
25 g fresh basil, plus extra sprigs to garnish
25 g fresh oregano
1 tablespoon butter
2 onions, finely chopped
450 g risotto rice
175 ml dry white wine
2 pints vegetable stock
Salt and pepper

- Preheat the oven to 200c/ gas 6
- Place the squash in a roasting tin
- Mix 1 tablespoon of the oil with the honey and spoon over the squash
- Turn the squash to coat it
- Roast for 30 - 35 minutes until tender
- Put the basil and oregano in a food processor with 2 tablespoons of the oil and process until fine
- Heat the butter and remaining oil in a large , heavy pan or wok
- Fry the onions until tender (about 8 minutes)
- Add the rice and cook for another two minutes, stirring
- Pour in the wine and bring to the boil
- Reduce the heat and cook until the wine is almost absorbed
- Add add the stock a little at a time and cook over a low heat for 20 minutes
- Gently stir in the processed herbs and squash , thoroughly mix and cook a further five minutes
- Season well with salt and pepper and serve, garnishing with sprigs of basil

Scam NHS cold calls - beware of fake calls from "receptionists" or "doctors" asking you to update your GP records or risk being removed from the surgery.

There are about 30 in Oxon at moment and **the County's first for c. 25 years**. Also had fly through Peregrine and female Merlin (only my 2nd record at Waterstock). Brilliant end to the year taking the year list up to 110 species"*

As I write we are experiencing a very cold snap with lot of frost and ice and even a little bit of snow – my little grandsons who had only really seen snow on the TV asked if it was going to be Christmas again and would Santa be coming soon!
