

Holton, Waterperry & Waterstock News is delivered monthly and free-of-charge to all households in the three parishes, with additional copies left in the parish churches.



Letter from the Vicarage

Hello,

In some medieval books of hours the occupation for April is flower picking. I suspect this choice was not made by a farmer! April's derivation is uncertain – as with all the months the name derives from the Romans but in this case it's not clear why they called it *Aprilis*. Traditionally the thought is that it is from the verb *aperire* meaning to open. This would refer to the opening of buds and leaves that occur during the month. Another thought is that as many Roman months were named for gods and goddesses and April is associated with Venus the God of love, the month's name was taken from the Greek goddess of love Aphrodite and that Aprilis was originally her month - Aphrilis. Or it could derive from the Etruscans – the predecessors of the Romans in Italy, who named the month Apru.

No matter the origin there is the usual eclectic mix of celebrations beginning of course with Fools day to kick the month off – in the US there are the usual celebrations of food some oddly specific, April being Grilled Cheese and also Soft Bagel month. In New Zealand the third Wednesday is Administrative Professionals' day. Great to see these back office desk toilers suitably celebrated! And one for all of us to enjoy – the 6th is national beer day here in the UK. The 26th is Hug-a-Friend day – so if someone you know suddenly hugs you that's the reason. Obviously if that happens and it's not the 26th you might be a bit worried.

However and whatever we celebrate during the month we know and love April for the flowering of spring. The predominant colours are white and yellow, drifts of flowering bulbs that have hidden themselves in our woods, lawns and borders raise their heads and become resplendent and hawthorn, blackthorn, gorse and broom take their moment to show off in hedgerow and roadside. It's a very busy time for gardeners as seedlings are planted out and beds, boxes and tubs are re-planted and fingers are crossed up and down the country that we have seen the last of frosts. Never forgetting as Flanders and Swann had it: *April brings the sweet spring showers*,

On and on for hours and hours.

April is also the month of Easter, this year the weekend of the 18^{th} - 20^{th} – which is the ultimate 'opening up'. At Easter we celebrate the opening up of the way to God, new unconquerable divine life made available to all who desire it. On Good Friday we remember the gift of his life by Jesus and then on the Sunday we celebrate the break-out moment of the whole of history as the power of death is broken once and for all as he leaves his tomb empty. Spring is a reminder that there is always new life after 'death', the certainty of the seasons is a picture of the bigger truth of new life here and now and after death for us made certain through the events of Easter.

As it happens the first Wednesday of April is designated the National Day of Hope – and hope is a very precious commodity. Easter is the life changing hope of eternity made real, eternal love being offered without price. And so this April I trust you will find the hope of Easter and the springtime joy of new life for you and all who you love.



From your County Councillor

As I go around the Division, potholes are very understandably a cause of immense frustration amongst councillors. It's that time of year where they are traditional at their worst when the cold wet weather exacerbates an already chronic and increasingly difficult situation. It is also election season and so there are social media posts and leaflets apportioning blame for who is responsible and that makes people even more angry and frustrated. I don't wish to further inflame that situation but I do want to try and lay out why I believe we have a problem on the roads, what we are doing about it and what should be done long term.

Why has the problem rash of potholes arisen?

- 1. For over a decade the previous government slashed funding to local government. This was particularly focused on "non-statutory" expenditures as highways are. Nearly three-quarters of Oxfordshire County Council (OCC)'s revenue expenditure is taken up by adult, disabled (some extremely disabled) and children's care plus SEND (Special Educational Needs), EHCPs and other Children's and Social Services. The numbers and complexity of these cases has mushroomed nationally. Expensive EHCP cases rose from 2 thousand in 2015 to 7 thousand by 2025. In addition longevity means that older people are increasingly growing as a share of our population. Central Government has failed to fund these obligatory requirements adequately. Yet, quite rightly, no party has proposed ceasing or curtailing this compassionate provision. At last, steps are promised to improve funding for 2025-26. But in the face of this historical decline the local Conservatives proposed cutting the Council Tax rise from the 5% as recommended by central government, to 4.5% at a cost in 2025-26 and every year thereafter of £2.5m.
- 2. As a result of the above the historical funding, provision for Highways maintenance and resurfacing has been slashed to <u>less than half</u> what is needed. All across the country a rash of extra potholes has been breaking out. Even before being defeated in country elections in 2021, the local Conservatives had admitted that it would have cost over £600m (now plus inflation) to put Oxfordshire's roads and bridges back into a proper condition!
- 3. I believe that the pothole problem has been worse in Oxfordshire for the following reasons:
- a. Oxfordshire is a geographically large and rural county with lots of country roads.
- b. During the Conservatives tenure they cut back gully clearing to a 4-year programme resulting in storm floods and causing related potholes.
- c. Patching alone is not enough and for too many years, under austerity, they cut back on capital funds for resurfacing and road renewals
- d. The cumulative effect of the above over 14 years now has been to let water and ice into the very spine and shoulders of our roads such that lurking below there is now a mass of fissures just waiting to break out as more and larger potholes!

It is fair to note that in the years since 2013 – with different parties – there have been efforts to improve matters and to encourage use of better systems and equipment. The original contractor was taken over - twice. The Conservatives extended the original contract - twice – such that it now ends in March 2025 – a full 15 years! In 2019 – with a strong intervention by (then) Lib Dem opposition councillors - a Highways "Deep Dive" report was authored by Cllr Jenny Hannaby, 16 recommendations for change were made (& all accepted) - including tougher

supervision – particularly of work by the contractor's sub-contractors. The report noted that by then Oxfordshire's roads were in such a state that 55% would be at "end of life" within 15 years! Also that the underlying harm sustained meant potholes would grow by 32% within 5 years. It noted that worsening weather could well cause more growth! In May 2021 the Conservatives tenure ended.

The background is important, but residents simply want stuff to work! So what is being done?

- A. The change of UK Government, the Chancellor's autumn budget and 2025-26 Local Government funding settlement has at least provided a bit better provision with particular focus on social care, SEND and potholes.
- B. The OCC budget has provided for an extra £50m 2-year fund for capital improvements to our highways. Separately, extra funding has been provided to revert to an annual gully clearing regime (see 3b above) and for extra improvements, so there should be less dangerous storm flooding and fewer potholes arising from it. But it should be noted that this capital expenditure involves incurring debt. The asset value of Oxfordshire's road network is worth in excess of £5 bn so protecting those assets makes sound financial sense it is also necessary to maintain safety.

In the long term funding the roads off the back of ever increasing borrowing makes no sense. So we are trying to invest in active and public travel and discourage unnecessary road trips where possible (difficult in our rural communities) The Liberal Democrats don't want to see massive future road building projects like the £400m HIF1 scheme we inherited between Didcot and the Gold Balls roundabout. But however we cut it we will at some point need to properly fund our highways network. It costs £45m it maintain the status quo and we get something like £11m that is simply not sustainable long term.

From your Member of Parliament

Dear residents of Holton, Waterperry and Waterstock,

It's been a busy few months both in Parliament and here in the constituency. I wanted to take the opportunity to share some of the key developments and actions that have taken place recently.

Improving ADHD Services in Oxfordshire

Our campaign to improve ADHD services in Oxfordshire is gaining traction. I joined other MPs in writing to the Health Secretary to call for urgent action, and I followed this up with a conversation with local NHS leaders to push for the restoration of much-needed specialist services. I am hopeful that some of these services, particularly for young adults transitioning from CAMHS (Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services) to adult services, will be brought back soon.

Local Council Developments

I will be stepping down in May as an elected Councillor but in February, I attended both council budget meetings:

- The Oxfordshire County Council budget included a historic £59 million increase in funding for road maintenance.
- At South Oxfordshire District Council, the budget was passed with an increase in grants for community and voluntary groups, which are vital for their continued support and success.

National Legislation and Water Issues

In January, there were some significant discussions on national legislation. One key piece of legislation focused on improving the regulation of water companies and addressing issues with sewage. Unfortunately, several proposed amendments to strengthen the Bill, such as tightening rules around bonuses for water company executives failing to meet performance standards, were not included in the final version.

I also spoke in support of an amendment that would enforce higher ecological standards in National Landscapes and National Trails. This is particularly important to us here in Oxfordshire, as we work to protect our countryside.

Flooding Crisis Update

The flooding crisis continues to be a priority for me. In response, I tabled an Early Day Motion in Parliament calling for the Government to review eligibility criteria for flooding support schemes. It's vital that all affected properties are given the support they need.

Waterstock Golf Course

At the time of writing there has been no decision on the planning appeal into the Waterstock Golf Course. I spoke in favour of South Oxfordshire District Council's refusal of proposals to build on the land along with your county and district councillor Tim Bearder who has been fighting it for years.

It has now been nearly 2 months since the Inquiry closed so the decision must be imminent, please feel free to sign up to my mailing list if you want to hear the latest when it happens - www.oxonld/get-involved/get-email-updates.

Supporting Local Organisations

I was pleased to meet with the parents of the Oxfordshire Smartphone Free Childhood Thame group, where we discussed ways to improve online safety for our children. This meeting was ahead of the second reading of the Safer Phones Bill in March.

I also visited Thame Citizens Advice and the Sharing Life Trust food bank, both of which are doing essential work in supporting vulnerable residents locally. It's clear that their efforts are invaluable, and I offered my support for the work they do in the community.

As always, I am holding regular surgeries and responding to residents on individual cases. If you have any concerns or need assistance, please don't hesitate to get in touch.



Our projects so far.....

Our first project is to plant up an agricultural trough, kindly donated by Will & Lois Selmes of Rectory Farm, with a selection of mostly native plants to increase the biodiversity of the village verge. It will have a variety of plants that will be good for pollinators but see if you can also spot the fox & cubs, purple toadflax and sneezewort!




The churchyard

Our village has a 'secret' space that most visitors and even some villagers don't know exists – our wonderful little walled churchyard. This churchyard, still an active burial ground for parishioners, has been largely untouched for centuries and this makes it a haven for wildlife: not necessarily the big exciting four-legged variety, kept out by the surrounding high wall, but potentially for all sorts of small and interesting wild plants and creatures. There are brambles and ivy, dainty wildflowers, cushiony mosses and vibrant lichens, all supporting a myriad of insects and creepy-crawlies. In turn, these all support a population of birds and small busy mammals such as fieldmice, shrews and voles and quite possibly toads and maybe grass snakes or slow worms. All quietly going about their industrious lives mostly undisturbed. It would be exciting and important to identify the life within the churchyard, so we'll be looking at projects to involve as many people as possible to help record the findings.

Sharing information

Did you know there is a lovely new noticeboard (perfect for fitting parish notices into) on its way soon to the village?

In the meantime we are exploring the idea of repurposing our custom handmade noticeboard into a feature heritage trail Interpretation board, celebrating the rich history, unique wildlife, and natural beauty of our village. This would include historic photos, key moments, and highlights of local flora and fauna, making it a focal point for both residents and visitors. With inspiration from similar successful projects in Waterstock and Wheatley, we hope to secure a national lottery heritage grant to bring this vision to life. Waterstock News

As we step into spring, the warmth of the sun and the sight of daffodils are a welcome relief after the cold and damp of the winter months.

As many of you are aware, life changed significantly for a few of us in the village back in September when the area saw a month's worth of rainfall in the space of a few hours. Personally, we would like to say a huge thank you to everyone that reached out to offer assistance and particular thanks to Janet and Stephen who gave us a home to stay in for the first week post flood. We eventually found a temporary home in Thame where we have been for the last 6 months. Whilst we are obviously keen to return home, the children are enjoying the independence that being able to walk to and from school has brought them and, after our treadmill was unfortunately destroyed by the flood water, Lizzie is also taking full advantage of the novelty of having pavements and streetlights as she trains for the London Marathon.

Rob Arthur provided a recent update on the ongoing efforts to address flooding issues in the village. After reaching out to Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) Highways for support, Rob worked closely with their team, including Carl Stallwood, who visited the village in January to inspect the problem areas. In February, Chloe from the OCC Highways Engagement team joined Rob and Geoff Talbot for another walk-round to assess flooding and surface damage. As a result, potholes were repaired by March 19th, and further inspections will take place in May and November. Rob is still awaiting feedback from Carl on proposed actions to improve culverts and ditches, but Chloe has kindly agreed to follow up on this, ensuring that these matters continue to progress. Thanks to Rob for initiating these discussions.

We would like to extend a warm welcome to Sarah Bell, the new owner of Kimmeridge. It's always exciting to see new faces in the village, and we hope Sarah will feel at home here as she settles in.

Finally, as I write this, there is still no news regarding the outcome of the Planning Inquiry, but we expect a decision any day now.

Despite our unwavering commitment to providing high quality, ethically farmed meat, we have found it increasingly difficult to compete with supermarkets and sellers who care less about the origins, welfare & slaughter of their meat.

Staying true to our values and prioritising animal welfare, sustainability & supporting local farming has always been at the heart of what we do. To run an independent farm shop comes at a big cost and sadly economies of scale from the big players have beaten us.

I would like to thank our incredible team who, I'm sure you will agree, have consistently produced outstanding produce for you all to enjoy.

The farm will continue as normal and the farm team here are planning for a busy lambing & calving period ahead and onwards into 2025. We will continue to uphold our values on the farming side of the business and continue with the routes to market we have established there.
