

Letter from the Vicarage

Hello,

June is named after the Roman goddess Juno. Juno was considered the queen of the gods and was the goddess of marriage and childbirth. But her influence didn't stop there – as the wife of Jupiter and mother of the god Mars Juno herself was seen as a warrior figure and in particular the protector of the women of Rome. So given all that it's ironic that we will celebrate Father's Day on the 15th of this month. If our wives are OK with that.

In fact it is now generally agreed that the name Juno and hence June derives from the word *iuven* which is the root of the latin word for youth. *Iunior* means younger and we get our word junior from it. And so there is the implication of the vitality and energy of youth in the name of the month. And certainly June in the northern hemisphere is the month when the new rebirth in nature that May brings burgeons into the growth of the vital youth of summer. The colours of leaf and flower are vivid and the sky blue. June has the longest daylight hours of any month and nature knows how to make the most of them..

Last June was the hottest on record – the record previously having been held by the previous one – June 2023. Certainly if the weather in May is anything to go by our biggest challenge this June may well be water not sunshine. Given this expected heat it's good to know that the 19th is World Sauntering Day when we are all encouraged to slow down and relax. No second invitation needed here. Put that alongside the 11th which is the UN International Day of Play and June looks to be a laid back month.

As a counter to that, the occupation for June in Medieval Books of Hours was Haymaking. This was hard physical labour for the purpose of preparing fodder for the winter, a task which looked ahead, taking the present riches and storing them for needier times. This was in effect life saving work on behalf of animals who we depended on for food, drink and transport. It reminds us that nature is so ordered as to provide all the year for us if we are wise in our stewardship. It is an example of Gandhi's famous maxim that the earth provides enough for everyman's need not everyman's greed.

We are blessed in our villages with beauty and plenty. The apparent boundless fecundity of June burgeons all around us. We have a reminder in those of ages past who were more directly connected with the nature around them and whose relationship with it was one of hard work and constant vigilance that we cannot take what we have been given for granted. The Bible tells us that it is all a gift from God and that gift was given in trust and we are its stewards. The seeming robust youth of the June summer is the product of nature which is in a fragile balance which we have the power to either help maintain or help destroy.

We can and must rejoice in long days of June as a gift to be used to their fullest and whether it is the thwok of balls on racquets at Wimbledon or the thud of leather on willow on cricket grounds from Tiddington to Lords I wish you great joy. I myself am taking the opportunity of slipping away for a holiday hence the rather truncated service schedule.

The Annual Meeting of Holton Parish Council was held on Monday 12th May 2025.

Brian Pridmore was elected Chairman and Allan East Vice-Chairman for the year 2025/2026.

Parish Councillors are Robert Barter, Andy Murray and Andrew Mobbs.

Holton Parish Council Accounts 2024/2025 have been approved by the Internal Auditor and the Annual Governance and Accountability Return is to be forwarded to the External Auditor for review.

The Notice of Public Rights to inspect Holton Parish Council Accounts runs from Tuesday 3rd June 2025 – Monday 14th July 2025.



From your County Councillor

Local Election Results

Cllr Tim Bearder has been re-elected for a third term as County Councillor for the Wheatley Division and continues to represent our villages at district level. Tim secured 45.7% of the vote, with the Conservative candidate in second on 21.9% and Reform UK close behind on 20.3%. Cllr Bearder said: "Many who voted for other parties did so out of frustration, not extremism. I'll work hard to understand their concerns and deliver results for everyone in our community."

Waterstock Golf Course - Still No News

At the time of writing, there is still no update on the proposed development at Waterstock Golf Course. The delay may be due to the Planning Inspectorate's ongoing review of South Oxfordshire District Council's Joint Local Plan, but this remains speculation. Your local councillors and MP continue to stand firmly against the development.

Conservation Efforts on the River Thame

Freddie van Mierlo, MP for Henley and Thame, has joined forces with the River Thame Conservation Trust to combat the threat of invasive non-native species in our rivers. Councillor Tim Bearder, who has provided funding to support the charity's work in and around Waterstock, said: "Non-native Signal crayfish cause massive ecological damage to our rivers, and it's fantastic to see Freddie raising awareness of the urgent need to take action."

Flooding Update

The Section 19 Flood Report for Wheatley has now been published, identifying the primary cause as extremely heavy rainfall. The report makes several recommendations to help prevent similar events in the future.

Local councillors and your MP are continuing to press stakeholders to complete the long-awaited Section 19 report for those effected by flooding in this area. Their goal is to ensure proper flood mitigation work is carried out for the village and surrounding area.

Bus Service Update

Cllr Bearder is delighted at the success of the 49 service he was able to fund at the end of the last administration, however he is aware of the overcrowding issues on the service and is actively exploring solutions. One suggestion—asking Holton residents to change onto the 400 service at Wheatley—has been ruled out due to concerns over unreliable connections.

A more promising option being considered is the introduction of an additional service on another day, possibly starting in Cuddesdon to ensure space for passengers further along the route. However, this would require extra funding on top of the money already being spent supporting the route.

Discussions are ongoing, and officer and councillor Bearder hope to meet up soon now the elections are over and the make up of the council is clear.



Carol (nee Boater) and her husband Dave use only products from their shop, all trialled and tested by them. Carol uses well formed, strong plants in her baskets, using water - retaining coir liners and placing all the flowers into good compost and choosing varieties and colours carefully, Indeed they try to find and introduce new varieties each year. They were warmly thanked for their friendly demonstration.

Business included a vote on the resolution, 'Bystanders Can Be Lifesavers' to be taken forward to the national meeting. Indeed one of our members illustrated this point from an experience within her family. In a crisis all help is needed. Following on from this we will try and arrange first aid and resuscitation training in the village and also indicate how a defibrillator can help in an emergency.

Our next meeting is on the June 3rd when the speaker will be Amy Moore with a talk entitled 'Witches, Scolds and Mouldy Jades - Oxford Women's Words on Trial'. Sounds unusual. Visitors always welcome. Come and find out more.

As I write this, we are still in the grip of the warmest, driest May since the year dot and I can't help but feel that a hosepipe ban is inevitable this summer. I was reminded of the first Covid lockdown, when so many people were furloughed in Spring and spent a few weeks starting their summer tans at the government's expense! Although with a change forecast for the bank holiday weekend, we might be sploshing about in puddles again in June.

First – and hopefully obvious! – things first:

I hope you have noticed the smart newly painted telephone box in its full approved British Telecom livery. With that starting to look so shiny and bright the PC made enquiries about getting the post box repainted too.

It turns out that repainting post boxes is quite regulated and can only be carried out by approved agents, so after a couple of emails to the delightfully named 'Postbox Appearance' team at Royal Mail, they responded amazingly quickly, sending along a 'painting engineer' to tackle this obviously highly specialised job!

It was apparently completed in a single day, with liberal splashing about of red paint on nearby ivy and grass, but it seems to be a thick coat of paint that should last a few years.

The main thing is that we now have what are probably our two most prominent pieces of street furniture looking their very best.

We had a lively Annual Parish Meeting at the beginning of May and we were really pleased to see everyone that attended. We started the meeting with an exclusive viewing of the beautiful film made by Henry Manisty to support the Waterstock planning appeal, featuring the very special wildlife found along the River Thame. Unfortunately Henry was unable to give us his talk on the subject and at time of writing there is still no news on the success of the appeal, but he will certainly share that as soon as there is anything to report.

Caroline and Dawn updated on their projects to enhance the wildlife diversity of the village. The trough by the village white gate is planted and everything seems to be thriving in the warm weather and I'm sure it is already attracting lots of pollinating insects as the flowers develop. Dawn's suggestions and ideas boards for repurposing the old 'millennium' noticeboard were very well received and it seems that a rather superior bug hotel might be taking shape in the Rec this summer.

Other matters discussed were the ongoing road problems: the verges, the potholes, blocked drains and the traffic speed. It was great to have a couple of our younger residents at the meeting – thank you Chloe and Erin – and we hope we can continue to involve village children in new projects. It was lovely too to have representation from our neighbours up on the Common as a reminder that we don't only concentrate on strictly 'in the village' issues. We made notes on all the ideas that were put forward and the parish council will look at ways of taking some of these forward over the next few months.

Finally, there were suggestions to hold a village 'event' this summer, especially as we have a few new families in the village and it would be a great way to meet up. A popular suggestion seemed to be an informal picnic gathering in the Rec – something that could be fairly impromptu, depending on weather and would not involve too much formal organisation. It's something that was very successful in past years, so maybe it's time to reinstate it? Definitely something for further discussion and plans.

So, possibly till we all meet up for this we wish you all a happy, warm and sunny summer!

Waterstock News

On the 28 April, Sarah Godowksi became a grandmother for the first time. Her son Tommy and his partner Cat, who live just outside Barcelona, had a little boy called Oliver. On the very same day Sara Manisty became a Great Aunt (again), when her niece Clare had a baby boy too.

Gill Spencer was approached in March by Tiddlywinks the animal sanctuary in Haddenham, to release 5 adult male and female hedgehogs in the garden at Park Farm House. The aim is for them to spread, breed and populate Waterstock, which Tiddlywinks considers is a safe environment for them. Fingers crossed! So, if you would like to help them all to survive, Gill asks if you could put some food out for them at night, especially in the autumn when they need to reach a certain weight to get through the long winter. They especially like cat food or hedgehog pellets which can be bought at most pet shops and garden centres. Don't forget water too during the hot weather. Gill is sure they'll love their new home in Waterstock.

Speaking of cat food, for a couple of days, we had an unknown black cat with a pink collar at the Mill, hiding under any cars that happened to be parked there. Although we left food out, it quite naturally left us for the vastly more catsavvy Edward de Rivera, who welcomed her in, naming her Miss Whitesox. There she stayed for 3 weeks in Edward's kitchen before Edward and Gill Spencer took her to Medivet, which found that Miss Whitesox had been microchipped. They contacted the family, who were overjoyed and came and collected her. She had been missing a month. All ended happily.

Despite the presence of cats, Edward's efforts to attract more unusual birds to his garden are going from strength to strength. He reports having between 10 and 20 goldfinches and 8 green finches visiting each day. He feeds them on nyger seeds and sunflower seeds. He also has two great spotted woodpeckers and a plethora of robins, blackbirds male and female, long tailed tits, wrens, collared doves and pied wagtails.

We have had a tragic wagtail incident recently at the Mill. Grey Wagtails nest each year in cracks in the mill walls, and so it has been this year, in a crack in the river wall close to the wooden footbridge to our front door. All was going well, with 5 chicks being regularly fed by mum and dad, when a magpie raided the nest making several visits, each time flying away with a poor chick, and finally pulling the nest out of the crack to double-check there was nothing left to pillage. The poor parents kept on coming back to the nest for two days. However, there should be time for a second try. Let's hope.

Andy Peters, Waterstock's figurehead carver in residence, has published his new book, "Ships Figureheads: Famous Carving Families" and held a book launch at Waterperry. Andy has done a massive amount of research, and the result is a fabulous book, full of illustrations, which I can thoroughly recommend. Alas, Andy and Lilian Shaw are soon to leave us, moving into a house in Ickford - located conveniently close to *The Rising Sun*. We wish them all the best.
