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Holton, Waterperry & Waterstock News is delivered monthly and free-of-charge to all households in the three parishes, with additional copies left in the parish churches.



#### Letter from the Vicarage

Hello,

In 1752 something very strange happened in September – in fact it's never happened again. In that year the British Empire adopted the Gregorian calendar and so in the British Empire that year September 2<sup>nd</sup> was immediately followed by September 14<sup>th</sup>. In the space of a minute from midnight on the 2<sup>nd</sup> people were instantly 11 days older. But were they? We could now disappear down a complete rabbit hole of what time is – is it the measurement we use based on the annual round of nature or is it something that operates totally independently of us? And, maybe more to the point for the people at the time – what happened if your birthday was between the 3<sup>rd</sup> and the 13<sup>th</sup> inclusive?

In fact that last question is more relevant to September than any other month of the year because, fun fact, there are more birthdays in September than in any other month (based on figures from the last 20 years). So more people missed birthdays in those missing days than if the jump had been in any other month. Something the planners of the quantum leap in the calendar in 1752 probably didn't factor in in their decision making. 8 of 10 of the most popular birth dates in the UK occur in the last 2 weeks of September (the other 2 in the first three days in October).


Why? Well it seems there could be two main reasons although you may well know others. One is due to planning, that is couples wanting their children to be born at the beginning of the school year. The other is human nature – if you work out the most popular conception dates they fall in the Christmas holidays – long nights, more time together and evidence of the Christmas spirit in action maybe!

And the high 'harvest' of babies in September is echoed of course in the farming year. September was called "harvest month" in Charlemagne's calendar and September is still called *Herbstmonat*, harvest month, in Switzerland. The Anglo-Saxons called the month *Gerstmonath*, barley month, the time of that crop's harvesting. This link with harvest, particularly the fruit harvest, is illustrated in many Books of Hours where the occupation is treading the grapes. In these books there are many beautifully hand painted pictures of peasants, smocks lifted to their knees, stomping in the large wooden vats of fresh grapes.

The other notable annual natural event in September is the Equinox on the  $20^{th}/21^{st}$ . So September is the month that we switch to the daylight hours being in the minority. From the Equinox on until late March we in the northern hemisphere have longer each day with the sun below the horizon than with it above. If you are someone like me that is rather depressing – for some literally so. One of the things that Jesus declared about himself was that he was the 'light of the world'. He was of course talking about spiritual light not physical light but one can often influence the other. As the days darken I am sustained by the fact that the light that Jesus brought and indeed was in himself, is both constant and glorious, universally illuminating but also intensely personally enlightening. I trust this light will shine on you and in you this September and indeed every month.

Did you go to the Village BBQ this year? If you didn't you missed a real treat. The adults had music provided by Hunter 101 while they queued in great numbers for burgers and hot dogs and the bar did really good business. There was ample opportunity to socialise with neighbours and friends, helped by the relaxed atmosphere and warm weather. It seems to me, this is the best summer 'do' we have had for a long time. However, such success does not come without planning and the learnings from previous years' events. Thanks must go to all those who worked so hard to make this event a success. From the hard worked 'barbequers' to the bar staff and the ice—cream vendors and everybody in between, thank you all and well done. The whole evening was a tremendous success and a tribute to the good folk of Holton.

There has been a bit of a stream running down the road by the green for some time now. The story is the usual one of apparent incompetence by Thames Water and its contractors. A few weeks ago, a man dressed all in orange knocked on my door and asked how long the stream outside had been running. I told him that since the rain had stopped about 4 days ago and tried to disabuse him of the concept that this was ground water. He assured me that he would raise a job for that Friday and 'someone would look at it'. Well someone did look at it and to cut a long story short, the householder was informed that the leak was on their property and they were liable to fix it. Insurance contractors came out and established that it was not on the householder's property and that Thames were responsible to fix it. The Thames contractors then appeared to have a hissy fit and gave a timescale to investigate (not fix) of over one week and in the meantime, gallons of water flow down the street. The householders were extremely upset by this as they possibly stand to get a large bill from the leak. The story goes on but this is not new, we have had similar experiences a couple of times from Thames contractors who claimed that we were liable when in fact it was Thames who were at fault. Beware, and don't fall into the trap of accepting liability from contractors trying to shift the blame, is the lesson from this story.

#### **Public Meeting Brookes Campus/Holton Park Development**

A well attended meeting in Holton Village Hall on Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> August 2024. Plans were shown about the layout of the proposed site for 447 homes. Work to start on the demolition of existing structures early 2025. Concerns were raised about the sewerage provisions and the capacity at the Wheatley Ditch Pumping Station and could it cope with the extra load on the

Wheatley Ditch Pumping Station and could it cope with the extra load on the system. Also many concerns about the western access road leading to the Holton Turn/Flyover to the A40 and likely congestion competing with the school traffic at peak times and pedestrian safety in the area.

## ROAD SAFETY IN HOLTON AN INVITATION TO MAKE SUGGESTIONS

During this year's Annual Holton Village Meeting I asked if everyone who was happy with road safety in the village could please put up their hands. Either long experience had taught us all that raising a hand is tantamount to volunteering, and best avoided, or dissatisfaction was universal. Either way, not a single hand was raised. But just assuming, say, half the immobile arms meant dissatisfaction, it showed that the Parish Council (PC) had been right to resurrect the circa 2018 Road Safety Working Party to take stock of the state of road safety now and look for answers where problems exist.

To date, five dedicated souls have volunteered to form the initial core of the Working Party but others who have a serious interest are very welcome to take part. Obviously, bringing your fresh ideas to our discussions would be very valuable. Also, what we do is likely to include the sifting of ideas for priority, feasibility and cost, amongst other criteria such as acceptability. Researching the merit of ideas on the internet is another possible task to be done. Please do contact Sonja Barter or me should you be interested in joining in. The remit of the current Working Party is to take a broad view of road safety in the village, including the effectiveness of the 20 mph limit and to make any recommendations that are appropriate. The PC wishes, and the Working Party endorses, that this should be achieved through consultation with everyone living in the parish who wishes to engage with the issue.

## **Dr Rogers Trust Educational Grants for Young People in Holton**

When the Trust was set up in February 1980, the Constitution stated:-

"The objectives of the charity is to promote the education (including social and physical training) of children and young person's resident in the area of the ancient parish of Holton. The Trust Deed instructs that Trustees shall have special regard to the promotion of education in accordance with the principles and doctrines of the Church of England".

The Dr Rogers Trustees will be meeting in November 2024 to consider applications from apprentices, trainees and students, aged 14 to 21, who are resident in the parish of Holton, for grants to assist in the purchase of books and equipment or towards the cost of educational trips or courses.

A maximum of 2 grants per applicant will be considered, the first whilst at school and the second for undertaking further education up to the age of 21.

In 2023 five grants were awarded to young people.



This month, the Parish Council thought it would be useful to give some biographical information on your Parish Councillors and Parish Clerk, and what motivates them to serve our community:-

**Sue Parker (Chairman):** Born in West London and has lived in the village for 17 years. Her first job was as a graduate trainee at Harrods.

She enjoys gardening, walking, outings and meals with Rob, learning new art skills (currently stained-glass work and flower pressing).

A nice lady from the War Memorial Trust wrote to our Parish Chairman to say that they had received an email from a member of the public complaining about the condition of our War Memorial . Her moan was that she was unable to read the names of those from Waterstock which are carved into the Memorial. Chairman Rob leapt into action armed with power hose, scrubbing brush and enthusiasm and gave it a good going over. His work is soon to be highlighted by Geoff Talbot who is going to repaint the faded lettering. Apparently the Lady from the War Memorial Trust has already been in contact to thank us for the prompt response. Excellent work Mr Chairman, and a special thanks from me for the neat return of my hosepipe.

Henry Manisty reports that the dates have been set for the Public Enquiry to hear the Appeal by the Developer Greystoke against SODC's refusal last year of its application to develop the western section of the Golf Course site. Unfortunately, we are set for a marathon that will last - with some breaks- from October until January.

John Wilkinson writes that 5 Waterstock households hosted singers and other creatives for the Waterperry Opera Festival for the last few weeks. If there is anyone else who might like to do this next year or who like to become a member, please get in touch with John.

#### Michael Tyce writes:

"They say that insuring thatched houses is an expensive proposition, but rates ease somewhat if chimneys are raised to the regulation 1.8 metres above the thatch. Eventually the expense of raising the chimneys should cover the cost of the scaffolding and building work. See if you can spot the difference! According to the District Council, quite a number of thatched cottage owners locally are doing the same.

There are unintended consequences though. Apparently chimney sweeps sweep by the yard, and Santa's health and safety team wont let him work at such heights without an extra glass of sherry on the hearth."

In early August, Alex Haines completed a section of La Haute Route starting at Chamonix. The route - exclusively on foot apart from 2 cable cars to take him to verbier - took him over 120km, from France in Switzerland, over 7 mountain passes including le Col de Louvie and Riedmatten Pass, with a total elevation of 6,600 metres. He spent 5 nights on La Haute Route, of which 3 were in refuges at altitude. Marmottes and Chamoix aplenty, alex crossed le grand desert (a glacier existed here until 2000) - not a single other human in sight - only dozens of ibex. Crucially, alex wore his Waterstock cap during the whole hike to protect him from the sun. He finished in Evolene in Switzerland, the last stronghold of patois spoken by three generations of Swiss locals
